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- Do you think there is a limit to God's forgiveness?

- "The Lord also has put away your sin" (<u>2 Samuel 12:7-</u>) <u>15</u>).
- Outrageous? You don't just pass over adultery and murder and lying. Righteous judges don't do that.

How bad can you get?



Outrageous!

sin would be good outrage if God were simply sweeping David's sin the Son of God is outrageous enough, and the glory of God that it adultery and murder and lying. (John Piper)

The outrage that we feel when God seems to simply pass over David's under the rug. He is not. God sees from the time of David down the centuries to the death of his Son, Jesus Christ, who would die in David's place, so that David's faith in God's mercy and God's future redeeming work unites David with Christ. And in God's all-knowing mind, David's sins are counted as Christ's sins and Christ's righteousness is counted as his righteousness, and God justly passes over David's sin. The death of upholds is great enough, that God is vindicated in passing over David's

of the glory of God, ²⁴ and are justified by his grace as a God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, faith in Jesus.

A pattern for confession

- 1. He confesses his sin and asks to be judged (v.3-5)
- 2. He prays for the forgiveness of his sin (v. 1, 2, 9)
- 3. He prays to be made clean (v. 2, 7, 10) hyssop
- 4. He prays for grace to sin no longer(v. 10, 12).
- 5. He prays to receive joy and power from the Holy Spirit (v. 8,11, 12)
- 6. He prays for freedom to access and worship God (v. 15).
- 7. He promises to serve others (v. 13)
- 8. He promises to worship God (v. 14, 15)
- 9. He prays for the world (v. 18)

- Used in ceremonial cleansing; (Leviticus 14:1-7; Numbers 19:1-19)
- Of a sinner from the guilt of sin the blood;
- Of a saint from the defilement of sin the water;
- Used during the Passover to put the blood of the passover lamb over the doorposts of Israel's homes
- Used to give Jesus a drink on the cross! (John 19:28-30)

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Confession is nothing without repentance

Redemption

David was known as one of the greatest kings of Israel **Reigned for 40 years** Is mentioned in the Faith Hall of Fame (Heb 11) Is an ancestor of Jesus. (Jesus was referred to as Son of David) Wrote about 80 of the Psalms God called David a man after His own heart (Acts 13:22)
